

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I have been privileged the past 8 years as the Hocking County Health Commissioner, of being able to write the opening remarks to our annual report. Each of these years has allowed me to do so with much pride, and to do so again this year. In my opening remarks, I usually write about an activity or accomplishment that occupied a significant amount of our time and effort during the past year. This year, I would like to write about a special person that has devoted many hours to public health in Hocking County.

Dr. George Ralph worked in public health in Hocking County for over 28 years. He started with the Logan-Hocking County Health District June 10, 1986 replacing Dr. J.W. Doering, M.D. as Health Commissioner. Dr. Ralph acted as Health Commissioner for Hocking County until September of 2007 when I became Health Commissioner. He continued to work for the Logan-Hocking County Health District in the capacity of Medical Director from September, 2007 until January, 2015.

During Dr. Ralph's work in public health, he was able to guide the staff at the Health Department through food borne outbreak investigations, the establishment of a pre-natal clinic, immunization and influenza vaccination clinics, environmental health programs, the white powder scares, regional smallpox vaccination clinics which were secondary to a possible terrorist threat, H1N1 Influenza Pandemic and disaster preparedness. He also continues to work with Dr. Hayward to hold free medical clinics to help those that are under insured and cannot afford adequate medical care.

Knowing that Dr. Ralph was there to consult with and seek guidance from during these activities was very valuable and helped to better the health of the population of Hocking County. I have not met another person in my life with a more passionate heart for the betterment of man-kind than Dr. Ralph. I know that even though he no longer holds a formal position with the Logan-Hocking County Health District, he will always find ways to be in touch with our lives and better the publics' health.

Dr. Ralph, thank you for your years of service and know that you will be missed at the Hocking County Health Department. We wish you much success in all that you continue to do.

Environmental

Quite a few new eateries have opened here in Hocking County over the last couple of years. The Hocking County Health Department plays an important role along with other state and local agencies to make sure all new food facilities are safe and sanitary for the public to enjoy.



Department for the plan review process based on the Ohio Administrative Codes. The plans must include a list of documents including but not limited to: potable water source; sewage disposable method; floor plans showing plumbing fixtures and equipment; and a proposed menu with food sources and food handling procedures. During the construction, the plumbing inspector will visit the site multiple times to ensure all plumbing lines and fixtures are installed correctly according to the plans. This is to avoid any sanitary and safety issues such as backflow or cross connection contamination; backup of sewer gas into the building; and inadequate or unsafe hot water temperature and future blockage.

Prior to opening to the public, sanitarians will conduct a pre-licensing inspection to ensure the facility is clean and sanitary, all equipment is in working condition, food is handled properly, and managers are trained in food safety. Once the facility is up and running, the sanitarians will conduct periodic inspections under the

guidance of the Ohio Department of Health and the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

- The following environmental programs were surveyed by state agencies and were found to meet the minimum acceptable standards; Public Swimming Pools, Campgrounds, Food Service Operations, and Retail Food Establishments.
- Registered Sanitarian Minchen Vickers, participated in the Zero Waste Committee and Hocking College Advisory Board.
- Over the past few years 66 homeowners utilized the EPA funded WPCLF (Water Pollution Control Loan Fund) program to repair/replace their failed sewage treatment system totaling \$368,000.
- The Annual Contractor's Workshop was held February 13 at Lees Banquet Haus in partnership with the Hocking Soil & Water Conservation District, the Fairfield Department of Health and the Perry County Health Dept.

Preparedness

The preparedness division collaborated with other divisions in the health department, as well as other health departments in Ohio's southeast central region and our Epidemiologist to keep our public informed and educated during and after the Ebola Hemorrhagic Disease incident in the Cleveland/Akron area. Staff were involved in the following preparedness efforts:

- Met with responders in the county to discuss management and communications should an individual with suspected EHD exposure traveled to or stayed in our county;
- Developed a small pamphlet on disinfecting housing (with unknown exposure); and
- Developed a policy & procedure for home visits to monitor guarantined individuals, if needed.



- •Assisted in the development and execution of two (2) tabletop exercises delivered at three (3) locations, one (1) functional exercise delivered throughout the Southeast Central Region, and four (4) regional communication drills.
- Assisted Gallia County Health Department, Gallipolis during a weeklong water outage with public information/education.
- Participated in local and regional healthcare coalitions throughout Southeast Central Ohio.
- Participated in 11 regional public health preparedness workgroups to develop response plans, plan and develop response training, plan and develop drills and exercises for local health departments.

Public Health & Ebola



The 2014 Ebola epidemic is the largest in history, affecting multiple countries in West Africa. Two imported cases, including one death, and two locally acquired cases in healthcare workers were reported in the United States. CDC and partners are taking precautions to prevent the further spread of Ebola within the United States.

October 19, 2014

ODH began issuing a daily report summarizing the number of individuals who have been found to have contact of some type with the Dallas nurse who was in Northeast Ohio, Oct. 10-13.

Public Health Monitoring

A post-arrival active monitoring program began October 27 in the six states (Georgia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Virginia) for incoming travelers from Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone. Active post-arrival monitoring began in the rest of the states in the days following. On November 17, travelers from Mali were included in these active post-arrival monitoring activities.

Public Health Triumph

West Africa is seeing the largest Ebola outbreak in history. Despite regular travel in and out of the affected countries by health professionals and ordinary people, there has been a grand total of two — not two hundred, or two thousand, but two — Americans who contracted the disease here, and both of them were nurses who had treated a dying patient who had contracted the disease in Liberia. Both of them were treated and survived.

Nursing

With tobacco use in Hocking County exceeding both the national and state average, the nursing division has added three new tobacco cessation and prevention programs to combat the issue. A public health nurse was trained and certified as a tobacco treatment specialist and provides one-on-one tobacco cessation counseling sessions to the public at no charge. In addition, the nursing division is also incorporating a program called Baby & Me Tobacco Free.



Pregnant women attend several tobacco cessation counseling sessions and are then eligible to obtain a diaper voucher each month she remains tobacco-free, for up to six months post-partum. Finally, the stand program has also been implemented by the nursing division to get Logan High School and Logan Middle School students involved in tobacco prevention activities. Since nearly all smokers begin using tobacco before the legal age of eighteen years old, the goal of the stand program is to prevent tobacco use before it begins with teenagers.
